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Etal Circular


Distance: 6 Miles
Grade: Easy to moderate with some climbs

Suggested donation for this leaflet 20p

Follow the directions below in conjunction with the map overleaf & the colour coded way-markers along the route (as shown above)

- A. Start/Finish in the car park at Etal Castle. Follow the road out of the car park and turn left (signposted 'riverside walks').
- B. Go through the small gate signposted Tindal House/Twizell Bridge and follow the path (part of the Sustrans Route 68 Derby-Berwick cycleway) alongside the river to Tindal House.
- C. Turn right onto the tarmac road at Tindal House, follow the road until you reach the T-junction then turn right.
- D. After 500m take the signposted footpath across the field to your left. Zigzag left and right across the road and walk past Greenlawalls Farm.
- E. Follow the signposted and way-marked route behind Greenlawalls farm, then follow the waymarked path which turns right, goes uphill to cross a road and then into a wood.
- F. Follow the signs across several fields and through two small woods, eventually out onto moorland. Turn right and walk along fence line beside the wood.
- G. Follow the track until you reach the road; turn right past Letham Hill and at the bottom turn right again, following the footpath to Etal Village.

Along the way

Wildlife abounds on the River Till and in the surrounding countryside – keep your eyes peeled! There are fabulous views across the Milfield Plain towards Cheviot, and towards the Eildon Hills in the Scottish Borders.

Etal Moor was once the site of some of the many rural mine works in the area
 (care should be taken to avoid the fence-marked disused shafts).

Letham Hill

The site of a 200 year old smithy, Letham Hill is home to a busy sawmill, a working farm and to The Great Northumberland Bread Company, an artisan baker.
